- o Dimmer switches are usually installed at the standard height of 48 inches to maintain consistency and usability .
- o Rocker and toggle switches generally follow the same standard but can be adapted lower in children's rooms or specialized environments .
- o Smart switches with touch or motion sensors may have more flexible placement but should remain within the accessible range for manual override and maintenance .

Practical Tips

- o Ensure switches are at least 100 mm away from door edges to avoid interference .
- o Avoid obstructions and provide clear labeling or tactile features for visually impaired users .
- o In industrial or commercial settings, switches with fuses or circuit breakers must be readily accessible, with working space requirements of at least 6.5 feet or the height of the equipment, whichever is greater .
