

Can power and low-voltage cables for surveillance systems be shared in the same cable tray

NEC (National Electrical Code) Article 300. 3 (C) (1): Prohibits the mixing of power and low-voltage cables (e., control, communication) in the same raceway or tray unless specific separation or shielding requirements are met. Maintaining proper separation between power, data, and limited energy cabling is foundational to system performance, safety, and code compliance. Separation isn't just an EMI precaution -- it protects signaling, reduces rework, and ensures pathways meet inspection expectations across risers. A common question arises: Can power cables and instrumentation/communication cables be run in the same cable tray? This article explores technical standards, safety considerations, and best practice.
