

Does your home electrical distribution box have a ground wire

- o Non-Metallic Boxes: Plastic or composite boxes generally do not require grounding unless they have metallic components such as frames or hinges (Coloria Group) .
- o Grounding Conductor: A dedicated green or bare copper wire, known as the grounding electrode conductor (GEC), connects the distribution box to a grounding rod or plate buried in the earth (Cline Electrical Service) .
- o Resistance Standards: Proper grounding should achieve a maximum resistance of 25 ohms to ensure effective dissipation of fault currents (Coloria Group) .

Practical Considerations

- o Material Quality: Use certified copper conductors for grounding; avoid aluminum for buried runs as it corrodes over time (Coloria Group) .
- o Bonding: All exposed metal parts, including water pipes if used as grounding electrodes, should be bonded to the grounding system to maintain the same electrical potential (Cline Electrical Service) .
- o Inspection and Maintenance: Regular checks of grounding connections, rods, and conductors are essential to maintain long-term safety and compliance (E-Abel) .
