- o Future Expansion: Leave some slots free if possible, or choose a box with extra capacity to accommodate future additions like solar panels or EV chargers .
- o Phase Balancing: For three-phase systems, distribute single-phase loads evenly across phases to maintain balance and efficiency .

- o 16-20 lighting and general-purpose circuits
- o 4-6 dedicated circuits for kitchen appliances
- o 2-4 circuits for HVAC or water heaters
- o Remaining slots for future expansion or specialized equipment
