- o Load Requirements: Towers designed to carry multiple antennas, dishes, or other equipment require more steel, increasing weight.
- o Environmental Considerations: Towers in high-wind or seismic zones often have reinforced structures, which adds to the overall mass .
- o Material: Galvanized steel is standard for corrosion resistance, but heavier alloys or thicker steel sections increase weight.

Practical Implications

Knowing the approximate weight is essential for transportation, crane selection, and foundation design. For example, a 12-meter tower weighing around 2,500 kg may require a smaller crane and lighter foundation than a 12-meter tower weighing 3,600 kg, which affects installation costs and logistics .
