

# Multiple brands of circuit breakers in the distribution box

## Preview

Mixing circuit breaker brands in an electrical panel is generally prohibited unless the combination has been explicitly approved and tested for safety. This allowance is governed by testing agencies like Underwriters Laboratories (UL), which establishes the regulatory framework. At its core, "mixing breaker brands" means installing miniature circuit breakers (MCBs), RCBOs, RCDs, or other protective devices from different manufacturers in the same distribution board or consumer unit. On the surface, this seems harmless. However, breaker. For example, the size of a 1-pole Homeline breaker (by Square D - Schneider) and a BR breaker (by Eaton) is typically 1 inch per pole. Because of these similar dimensions, they may appear to fit. Why do you need GFCI or AFCI breakers? Choosing the right size and setup for your distribution box keeps your electrical system safe and working well.

To avoid the possible troubles in the future, you should not install mix brands of breakers on the same panel.

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
