Mechanical Protection

Bending Radius: Optical fiber cables must not be bent below their minimum bending radius, typically greater than 20 times the cable diameter, to avoid internal fiber breaks and increased signal loss . **Tensile Strength:** Cables have specified pulling tension limits. Exceeding these limits can damage the fiber and alter cable characteristics. Use pulling grips with swivels and compatible lubricants to reduce stress during installation . **Twisting/Torsion:** Excessive twisting can damage fibers. Anti-twisting devices should be used during cable pulling to maintain integrity . **Suspension Hardware:** For overhead or suspended cables, use appropriate support structures, clamps, and hangers to prevent sagging, dynamic loading, or contact with sharp edges .

Environmental and Operational Protection

Weather and UV Exposure: Overhead cables should be designed to withstand environmental conditions such as sunlight, wind, and precipitation. Protective sheathing or armoring may be required . **Physical Barriers:** In areas prone to mechanical impact, consider protective conduits, cable trays, or steel armoring to prevent accidental damage . **Monitoring and Maintenance:** Regular inspection of suspended cables for sag, wear, or damage is essential. Smart monitoring systems can detect tension changes or fiber breaks early .

Safety Precautions for Personnel

Eye Safety: Laser light in optical fibers is invisible and can damage the retina. Never look directly into live fibers; use a power meter to verify the fiber is dark before inspection . **Handling Fiber Scraps:** Dispose of glass fiber fragments in sealed containers to prevent injury . **Chemical Safety:** Use adhesives and cleaning solvents in well-ventilated areas, following Material Safety Data Sheets (MSDS) for safe handling and disposal . **Personal Protective Equipment (PPE):** Safety glasses with side shields, gloves, and other PPE should be worn when splicing, terminating, or handling optical fibers .
