

Sockets are not allowed to be installed in the distribution box

Article Overview

Sockets are not universally prohibited in distribution boxes, but their use is restricted and must comply with specific standards and environmental considerations.

Regulatory Context

The belief that sockets cannot be used in distribution boards on construction sites is a myth. Distribution boards fitted with plug-and-socket connectors can be used if they meet the requirements of BS EN 61439-4 for assemblies intended for construction sites and if the connectors comply with BS EN 60309-2 standards for industrial plugs and sockets . The key consideration is that the equipment must be suitable for the environmental conditions, including exposure to impact, abrasion, moisture, and movement of structures or vehicles .

Standards and Compliance

- o BS 7671 (Requirements for Electrical Installations) requires designers to consider environmental conditions and select equipment accordingly (Regulations 132.5.1 and 133.3), .
- o BS EN 61439-1 specifies general requirements for low-voltage switchgear and controlgear assemblies, while Part 4 (BS EN 61439-4) covers assemblies for construction sites .
- o BS 7375 provides a code of practice for electricity distribution on construction and demolition sites .
- o Plugs and socket-outlets with rated currents from 16 A up to 125 A must comply with BS EN 60309-2, and higher-rated connectors (125 A-800 A) must comply with BS EN 60309-1 .

Practical Considerations

Sockets in distribution boards are often used for mobile equipment, extension leads, or temporary power distribution. They are acceptable if:

- o The board is preassembled and tested for reuse on-site.
- o Connections are made using industrial-grade connectors suitable for the expected load and environmental conditions.
- o The installation considers risk of damage, wear, and ingress of liquids or solids . For socket-outlets rated up to 32 A, additional protection by a 30 mA RCD is required in locations accessible to ordinary persons or children, unless a documented risk assessment justifies otherwise . Sockets rated above 32 A are not subject to this RCD requirement.

Summary

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While standard domestic-style sockets are generally not recommended in construction site distribution boards due to durability and safety concerns, industrial sockets are permitted if the distribution board complies with relevant standards and environmental requirements. The restriction is not absolute; it is based on safety, suitability, and compliance with BS EN 61439-4 and BS 7671. Properly designed and tested boards with industrial sockets provide safe, reusable, and efficient temporary power distribution on construction sites.
