- o If the cable is too short for practical splicing or the network requires high reliability, replacing the cable with a correctly measured length is often the best solution .
- o Measure twice before cutting to avoid repeating the issue.

o Use of Patch Cords:

- o In some cases, adding a fiber patch cord between the short cable and the equipment can bridge the gap, provided the total link loss remains within the design budget .

- o Accurate measurement: Always measure the required cable length carefully, accounting for routing paths, bends, and service loops .
- o Leave service loops: Include extra fiber at endpoints to allow for future maintenance, re-termination, or equipment relocation .
- o Follow installation guidelines: Respect minimum bend radius, avoid sharp bends, and use proper conduits or innerducts to protect the fiber .

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o Document and label: Keep detailed records of cable lengths, splices, and routing to simplify troubleshooting and future upgrades . By following these corrective actions and preventive measures, a short fiber optic cable can be effectively managed, ensuring reliable network performance and minimizing downtime.
