Role in Secondary Distribution Boxes

A secondary distribution box receives power from the primary distribution cabinet and distributes it to various circuits within a building . Inside, it typically contains three-phase circuit breakers and other protective devices. The white wires in this box may serve as neutral conductors for single-phase circuits or as re-identified hot wires for multi-phase connections, depending on the wiring configuration and local electrical codes.

Safety Considerations

- o Always turn off the circuit breaker before working on any wires.
- o Verify the function of a white wire using a voltage tester if it has been re-identified.
- o Follow local electrical codes and standards to ensure proper identification and safe installation .
