

What is the standard length for cable tray elbows

Article Overview

Cable tray elbows are typically sized to match the width and height of the straight tray sections they connect, with standard widths ranging from 150 mm to 900 mm and heights from 50 mm to 120 mm.

Standard Widths and Heights

Cable tray elbows are designed to maintain compatibility with straight tray sections. Common nominal widths include 150 mm, 203 mm, 300 mm, 450 mm, 600 mm, 750 mm, and 900 mm, while heights (side rail or tray depth) typically range from 50 mm, 70 mm, 100 mm, to 120 mm depending on the tray type and load requirements . The outside dimensions of elbows are slightly larger due to side rail thickness, which is important for wall or floor penetrations .

Elbow Types and Angles

Elbows are available in horizontal and vertical configurations, including 90° and 45° bends, to accommodate changes in cable routing direction. Horizontal elbows allow the tray to turn along the same plane, while vertical elbows enable elevation changes. The radius of the bend is generally designed to prevent excessive cable bending, ensuring compliance with cable manufacturer specifications and NEC fill requirements .

Material and Thickness Considerations

Elbows are manufactured from the same materials as the straight sections, such as steel (galvanized or stainless), aluminum, or wire mesh, and maintain the same material thickness to ensure structural integrity and load capacity . Typical thicknesses vary by tray type but are critical for supporting cable weight and preventing deflection.

Compatibility and Installation

When selecting elbows, it is essential to match the width, height, and material type to the straight tray sections. This ensures proper alignment, load distribution, and ease of cable pulling. Standard lengths of straight sections are usually 3 m or 6 m, and elbows are sized to integrate seamlessly with these lengths . By adhering to these standard dimensions, cable tray elbows provide reliable routing, maintain NEC compliance, and allow for future expansion without requiring custom fabrication.

The standard NEMA lengths for cable tray are 12, 20, 24 and 30-feet, although some manufacturers like Eaton
