

# Wiring number labeling for distribution boxes

Wire numbering in distribution boxes ensures clarity, safety, and traceability by following standardized principles and sequential labeling for both main and control circuits.

## Core Principles of Wire Numbering

Wire numbering in distribution boxes must adhere to four key principles: uniqueness, readability, continuity, and correspondence .

- o Uniqueness: Each wire in the same distribution box or system must have a distinct number, even across different circuits, often using prefixes or partitions.
- o Readability: Numbers should be clearly printed using legible fonts, with size and color contrasting the wire or cabinet background.
- o Continuity: Wires in the same functional circuit should be numbered sequentially, e.g., control circuits starting from "1" and main circuits following phase sequence plus serial numbers.
- o Correspondence: The same wire number must appear at both ends of the wire, including terminal blocks or across cabinets (e.g., "103-TB2-04" indicates wire 103 connected to terminal 04 of TB2).

## Letter and Number Marking

- o Letter Marking: Uppercase letters indicate the system or component the wire belongs to.
- o Number Marking: Arabic numerals indicate the serial number of wires within the same function, incrementing according to circuit partition or wiring sequence. For multiple circuits, a prefix denotes the circuit number (e.g., 1-01, 2-01) and suffixes indicate terminal or cabinet numbers if crossing boundaries .

## System-Specific Rules

- o Main Circuit (Primary/Power Circuit): Wire numbers combine component number + phase sequence + serial number to trace power flow, especially for high-current circuits like motors or inverters.
- o Control Circuit (Secondary Circuit): Numbering is sequential within the control system, often starting from "1" for each functional block, ensuring easy identification of relays, contactors, and auxiliary devices .

## Practical Wiring in Distribution Boxes

For single-phase domestic distribution boxes:

- o Main MCB: Connect the incoming phase and neutral to the main double-pole MCB.
- o RCCB: Connect the output of the main MCB to the RCCB for protection against leakage and shock.

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- o Load MCBs: Single-pole MCBs are connected to the output of the RCCB for individual circuits; double-pole MCBs may be used for special loads.
- o Neutral and Earth: Connect all neutral wires to the neutral busbar and earth wires to the earth busbar, ensuring proper grounding . Each wire should be labeled according to the numbering system described above, ensuring that any wire can be traced back to its source and load. This approach improves safety, simplifies maintenance, and ensures compliance with electrical standards .
